Scooter, a male mixed breed, came to SNIPSA in 2005. At that time, there was no official non-profit status, just a handful of well-meaning Samaritans chasing stray and unwanted animals around San Antonio.

Scooter was just another stray running with a pack and looking for his next meal. After being detained by the St. Mary's University campus police for traveling without a license, he made his way to the home of two veterinarians where he was scheduled to be neutered. After his surgery, Scooter was placed in an adoptive home. That didn't work out and within a week he was back with the veterinarians. He shredded the blinds, salivated in his kennel, and proceeded to wreck havoc throughout the house. And, he never left...

In 2006, the group officially formed SNIPSA – a local rescue dedicated to saving homeless and abandoned animals from high kill shelters. With the support of an incredible volunteer base and countless hours of work, SNIPSA has rescued and rehomed over 1,000 animals.



Journey of Faith

Faith, a Labrador Retriever, was rescued from Animal Care Services after being hit by a car and sustaining

a significant degloving injury. Her leg was so badly injured that it had to be amputated. Despite her injury, Faith is thriving. She showered her foster family with kisses and was always on the hunt for food. Faith was recently adopted to a couple with a large yard for romping, a pool for cooling off, and air-conditioning for sleeping. One of her favorite pastimes is retrieving her giant squeaky toy, three legs and all.



Opie Walks

Abandoned at a local bus stop, SNIPSA volunteers found Opie with severely

nerve damage along his spinal cord. There was much discussion about the course of action. Should we carry on or had Opie suffered enough?

decision was made. Opie, along with his devoted foster parents, went to the pool several times a week for physical therapy. Special splints were made to help him stand. In a matter of weeks Opie started advancing his hind legs, swimming laps in the pool and gaining strength daily. After two and half months the splints were removed and he now walks without assistance.



Trooper, a beautiful Husky, arrived to Animal Care Services with a luxated hip. Injuries such as this preclude otherwise healthy dogs from being adopted. Animal control facilities often lack the necessary resources to

offer the extra medical care such animals require.

An animal care employee was making her rounds as Trooper was being sedated for euthanasia. She asked that he be spared and transferred him to SNIPSA.

An adoption inquiry was made by the Towle family from Massachusetts after they discovered him on SNIPSA's website. Determined to adopt Trooper, they worked diligently with SNIPSA to make necessary travel arrangements. Anxious volunteers received a late night call that Trooper had arrived safely in Boston and was united with his new family. This is just one example of how important private rescue groups are in changing the fate of these animals.

Laverne and Shirley joined SNIPSA after being abandoned at Animal Care Services in a cardboard box. It was closing day of the old facility and animals were being carted to the new shelter. There was no room at the inn for this litter of puppies. They were riddled with worms and suffered from both demodectic and sarcoptic mange.

After months of treatment, they were taken to an adoption event. Shirley was adopted by a college student and they moved to North Carolina to attend graduate school.

But, the story doesn't end there. The student's parents were keeping Shirley and fell in love. They contacted SNIPSA in hopes that Laverne was still available. She was, and within a week she boarded a plane and arrived safely in Illinois to meet her new family.



Ingredients:

1 cup rolled Quaker oats 1/3 cup margarine 1 cup boiling water 3/4 cup corn meal 1 tbs. sugar 2 tsps. chicken or beef flavored bouillon 1/2 cup milk

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese 1 egg, beaten

2 – 3 cups whole wheat flour

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease cookie sheet.

In large bowl, combine rolled oats, margarine and boiling water; let stand 10 minutes. Stir in cornmeal, sugar, bouillon, milk, cheese and egg; mix well. Add flour one cup at a time, mix well after each addition to form a stiff dough.

On floured surface, knead in remaining flour until dough is smooth and no longer sticky, 3 to 4 minutes. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness, cut with bone shaped cookie cutter. Place 1 inch apart on greased cookie sheets. Bake at 325 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely. Store loosely covered. Makes 3 1/2 dozen large or 8 dozen small dog biscuits.

Dogs Go North

Due to a shortage of adoptable dogs in the northern part of the country, PetSmart Charities, in conjunction with progressive shelters, is moving animals north and saving lives.

Approximately 40 animals each month are transferred aboard "rescue wagons" specially equipped with air conditioning and roomy cages. They are accompanied by experienced personnel. Because of the overwhelming demand, most animals are adopted within 72 hours of their arrival.

Where is San Antonio Heading?

San Antonio is mobilizing around animal welfare on several fronts. Under the leadership of Mayor Phil Hardberger, City Manager Sheryl Sculley, and with community input, the city's Animal Care Services (ACS) Advisory Board developed a strategic plan intended to bring San Antonio to No Kill by 2012. No Kill means that every healthy, treatable, or rehabilitable animal is adopted rather than euthanized. The plan calls for greatly increased adoptions, transfer of ACS animals to rescue organizations, and free and low-cost spay/neuter. It has received widespread community support and was unanimously approved by City Council.

To assist in this mission, the San Antonio Area Foundation recently partnered with the city to establish and staff a community-wide Consortium of Partners to bring the entire community around the goal of No Kill by 2012. The Consortium

has contracted a major public relations campaign, OwnUP SA, designed to encourage families to spay/neuter their pets and provide responsible care. Peter Holt, owner of the San Antonio Spurs, is serving as Corporate Chair. Other corporate partners include Clear Channel Outdoor Communications, Rackspace, and WellMed. A city-wide billboard campaign featuring well known locals and their pets will be a visible part of the awareness effort.

AAPAW (Alamo Area Partners for Animal Welfare) is the third component in the equation of No Kill whereby rescue groups and adoption organizations join forces with the common goal of saving lives. AAPAW is focused on neighborhood and one-to-one education utilizing the existing infrastructure of neighborhood associations and civic organizations. Recent mega adoption events have proven to be very successful; placing more than 100 animals per event. Adoption events are held quarterly at accessible and highly traveled locations. The next mega adoption events are scheduled for Saturday, October 4th and Saturday, December 6th at the Rim Shopping Center. Please join AAPAW and support our mission of reaching No Kill.

Feral Cats and Their Future

Feral and unowned cats have long been viewed as a forgotten and nuisance population.

Traditional methods of trapping and killing feral cats have proven to be ineffective. Studies have indicated that by removing a feral cat from its environment, it only creates an ecological void allowing other unaltered cats to move in. Before you realize it, you have an entire population of unowned cats eating out of dumpsters and foraging for food, seeking shelter in alleyways, dense habitat, or anywhere they can establish a safe haven. The cats continue to reproduce and the problem doesn't go away. Cats are incredible survivors and will establish themselves in almost any environment.

The tax dollars spent on impounding, housing, and euthanizing feral and unowned cats is outstanding. Studies have proven that it is far more economical to sterilize and release a cat back into its familiar environment than to trap and destroy it. Low cost spay/neuter clinics are cropping up across the country to address the overwhelming need. Cats are humanely anesthetized through the trap, spayed/neutered, vaccinated, ear-tipped, and recovered from surgery. Within 24-48 hours they are returned to their habitat and are no longer contributing to the problem. Over time, the colony will diminish due to natural attrition.

(Feral Cats continued)

Recently, San Antonio has made great strides in its approach to feral cats. In December 2007, city ordinances were changed to legalize trap-neuterreturn (TNR) of unowned/ feral cats. Caretakers who have long been feeding and sterilizing cats on their own, finally garnished city recognition and support. A pilot program managed by Animal Care Services and Purr-Fect Haven at Sunken Gardens proved to be an effective method of controlling feral cat populations where aggressive sterilization was its driving force. Carefully selected feeding stations were established high off the ground to allow cats easy access while

prohibiting entry from other small mammals. Caretakers reported a far less number of litters being born during Spring/Summer 2008.

What we as a city need to keep in mind is that this is a community problem which requires community support. By increasing the number of community-based programs that allow cats to live out their lives side by side with the rest of us, we can effectively manage their numbers. Not only is TNR the most humane way to address feral cat populations, it is also the common sense way.


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What Can You Do?

1. Donations Welcome

SNIPSA is proud of the number of animals we have saved over the past two years. This would not be possible without our volunteers and the financial support of our community and friends.

Getting an animal ready for adoption is not simple. It requires that the animal be spayed/neutered, heartworm tested, vaccinated, microchipped, and treated for parasites. SNIPSA also assists a large population of injured and sick animals that have had little prior veterinary care. We are often their first stop and treat heartworm infection, skin and dental disease, and orthopedic injuries. With your support, we can continue our mission of saving animals in need.



Foster Families Needed

Foster families are the single most important variable in the number of animals SNIPSA is able to rescue. We do not have a standing shelter and depend entirely on volunteers to open their doors to house our animals. While in foster care we learn a great deal about the animals' needs and behavior – how they get along with cats, other dogs, small children, any escape tendencies, housebreaking, and general temperament. This helps us make a suitable match between the animal and his new owner. SNIPSA strives to find permanent placement for our rescues.

3. Spay it Forward

Did you know: For every unspayed cat, her offspring can produce 69,000 unwanted cats in just 7 years?

Join SNIPSA in sponsoring a spay or neuter and help reduce the exorbitant number of animals euthanized in our city every day. Trying to undo the damage of a breeding animal is an uphill climb. The true solution to reducing unwanted animals is to sterilize your pet. Not only does it reduce their risk of disease, but also unwanted behavioral issues such as marking, fighting, and roaming.
