A: Dear Adulting Since 1985,

As seen through the eyes of your dog, they may consider you quite ungrateful. This week alone, they just saved you from three Amazon drivers, two DoorDashers and one Girl Scout trying to sell "things". What are they supposed to do? Feed you to the living dead that walk this earth?

Distinct barks in response to the doorbell are totally appropriate. Your dog is alerting you that someone is entering your space. There are usually two reasons your dog barks. They may be excited that people are arriving – this is the social butterfly of the dog world, or they may be trying to warn them off and defend you – after all, you're the reason they live and breathe.

The key is to get your dog to stop barking once you acknowledge your awareness of the visitor. Allow your dog to bark 3-4 times, then say "Quiet" – do not shout. Go to your dog and gently touch their muzzle and repeat "Quiet", call them away from the door, ask them to sit and give them a treat. If they stay beside you, and remain quiet, continue to give treats until the stimulus is gone. If they resume barking right away, repeat the sequence.

Continue this training tip until the desired behavior is learned. If your dog continues to put their life on the line to ensure your bloodline lives on, a trainer may be in your future.
