## A : Dogstressed,

Look, I'm no therapist, but I can tell you a thing or two about cognitive health. There was a week where I fell off my walking routine and...ugh, my mental state went to the dogs.

Just like humans, we canines need certain tools in our lives to keep things gravy. By tools, I mean things like a safe space, a consistent feeding/walking schedule and, sometimes, "meds." Depending on what triggers your pup's anxiety, you may have to take different approaches to keep her from going Cujo. Let me better explain.

If your furry roomie starts ripping up your belongings when you leave, don't leave your stuff out. Too lazy to pick up? Consider using a kennel. Contrary to popular belief, kennels are a tool that helps keep your beloved things--and your DOG--free from harm. If you're worried about her being confined, offer a frozen Kong or put on a good soap opera. I'll let you in on a little secret, though. Dogs mostly sleep during the day anyway.

When it comes to car rides, there are a few approaches you can take. First, you can start your pet off with short trips to get her used to the idea. A couple of rounds to Starbucks for pup cups?
